


SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS



1-NO POVERTY

“836 million people still live in extreme poverty. The overwhelming majority of people living on less than \$1.25 a day belong to two regions: Southern Asia and sub-Saharan Africa.”

2 ZERO HUNGER



“Globally, one in nine people in the world today (795 million) are undernourished. Poor nutrition nearly half (45 per cent) of deaths in children under five – 3.1 million children each year.”




3-GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

“Globally, adolescent girls and young women face gender-based inequalities, exclusion, discrimination and violence which put them at increased risk of acquiring HIV. AIDS is now the leading cause of death among adolescents (aged 10–19) in Africa and the second most common cause of death among adolescents globally.”

“Enrolment in primary education in developing countries has reached 91 per cent but 57 million children remain out of school. An estimated 50 per cent of out-of-school children of primary school age live in conflict-affected areas.”



5 GENDER

“About two thirds of countries in the developing regions have achieved gender parity in primary education. But in sub-Saharan Africa, Oceania and Western Asia, girls still face barriers to entering both primary and secondary school.”



6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



“Water and sanitation are at the very core of sustainable development, critical to the survival of people and the planet. Goal 6 not only addresses the issues relating to drinking water, sanitation and hygiene, but also the quality and sustainability of water resources worldwide.”

“Energy is the dominant contributor to climate change, accounting for around 60 per cent of total global greenhouse gas emissions. Reducing the carbon intensity of energy is a key objective in long-term climate goals.”




8-DECENT WORK AND ECONOMIC GROWTH

“Global unemployment increased from 170 million in 2007 to nearly 202 million in 2012, of which about 75 million are young women and men. 470 million jobs are needed globally for new entrants to the labour market between 2016 and 2030.”

9 INDUSTRY, INNOVATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE



“Undeveloped infrastructures limits access to health care and education. For many African countries, particularly the lower-income countries, the existent constraints regarding infrastructure affect firm productivity by around 40 per cent.”



10-REDUCED INEQUALITIES

“A significant majority of households in developing countries - more than 75 per cent of the population - are living today in societies where income is more unequally distributed than it was in the 1990s. On average - and taking into account population size - income inequality increased by 11 per cent in developing countries between 1990 and 2010.”

“By 2030, almost 60 per cent of the world’s population will live in urban areas. Rapid urbanization is exerting pressure on fresh water supplies, sewage, the living environment, and public health.”

13 CLIMATE ACTION



“From 1880 to 2012, average global temperature increased by 0.85°C. Moreover, global emissions of carbon dioxide (CO₂) have increased by almost 50 per cent since 1990.”




14-LIFE BELOW WATER

“As much as 40 per cent of the world oceans are heavily affected by human activities, including pollution, depleted fisheries, and loss of coastal habitats. Oceans absorb about 30 per cent of carbon dioxide produced by humans, buffering the impacts of global warming.”

15 LIFE ON LAND



“Around 1.6 billion people depend on forests for their livelihood. This includes some 70 million indigenous people. 2.6 billion people depend directly on agriculture, but 52 per cent of the land used for agriculture is moderately or severely affected by soil degradation.”



16-PEACE, JUSTICE AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS

“Among the institutions most affected by corruption are the judiciary and police. Corruption, bribery, theft and tax evasion cost some US \$1.26 trillion for developing countries per year; this amount of money could be used to lift those who are living on less than \$1.25 a day above \$1.25 for at least six years.”

“Achieving the ambitious targets of the 2030 Agenda requires a revitalized and enhanced global partnership that brings together Governments, civil society, the private sector, the United Nations system and other actors and mobilizes all available resources. Enhancing support to developing countries, in particular the least developed countries and the small island developing States, is fundamental to equitable progress for all.”






